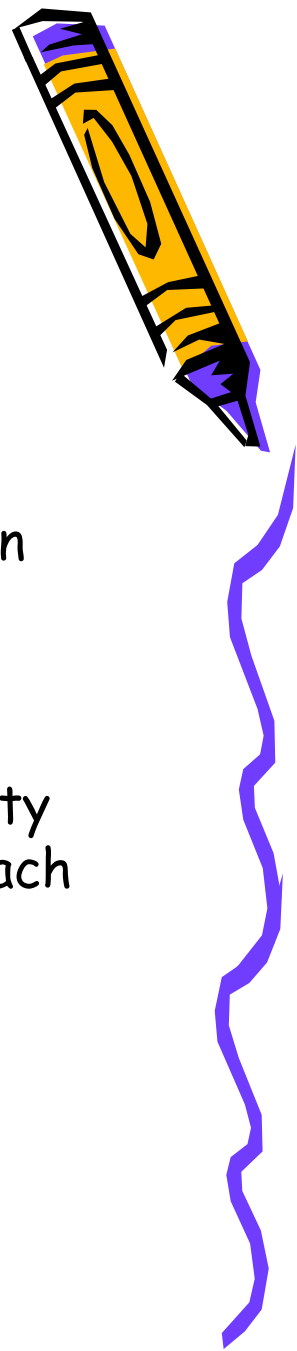
History



- Delray Education Board enacted 1990
- "Sharing For Excellence in School" Program
- Board advocates for fair share of funding and programming
- City creates strong partnerships with School District
- City has spent approximately \$10 million in support of local schools
- City Creates Permanent Education Advisory Board

"A community committed to promoting quality education through lifelong learning."

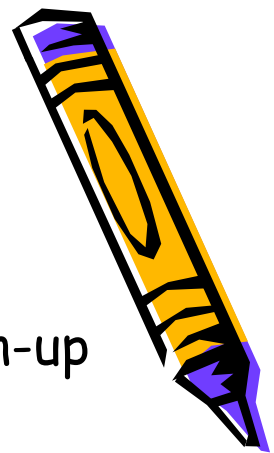
- **Mission:**

"The Delray Beach Education Board advocates for quality education and fosters partnerships between Delray Beach schools and the community."



Key accomplishments of The Delray Beach Education Board since 1994

- Repositioning SD Spady bus loop and neighborhood clean-up
- Relocation of Carver Middle School - "neutral area"
- Construction of Morikami and Banyan Creek Elementary Schools - reduce overcrowding
- Facilitated Montessori program at Spady, IB program at Morikami, and School of Arts at Pine Grove and Plumosa
- Relocation of Atlantic High School
- Created awareness programs: School Showcase, PENCIL, Walk A Child to School Day, Delray Reads Day, Delray Beach Popup Book
- Advocacy Examples: Middle School of the Arts, dance program at Carver Middle School; Criminal Justice Program



Key accomplishments of The Delray Beach Education Board since 1994

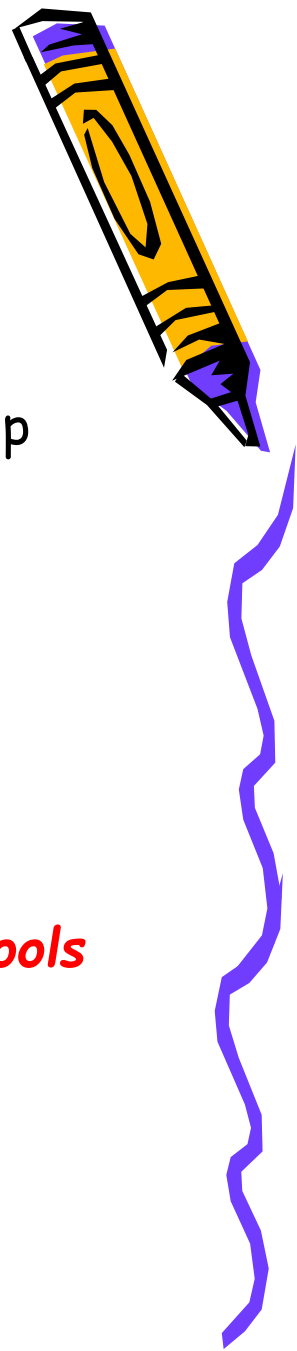


- Eagle's Nest Construction Academy
 - Won several State Awards for program and partnership
- Grant writing: summer book distribution with DB Public Library (Jarden) Target, AmTrust, Elks, etc.
- School District awards City of Delray Beach Business Partner of the year - 4 times
- Delray Beach highlighted at national conventions for best practice involving education i.e. Education Advisory Board, Education Coordinator position, and grade level reading
- 3 year strategic plan for the Education Board
- 2012 Finalist for All America City Award

 - ❖ Attendance - Data supported 5 year trend to reduce absenteeism
 - ❖ Summer learning Slide - Data supported stemming summer learning slide

Campaign For Grade Level

What the Data Told Us 2012



2847 K-3 students in Delray Beach - Our Target Group

- 81% do not have access to summer learning
- 45% do not read on grade level by 3rd grade
- 36% are not kindergarten ready
- 8% miss 10% or more of school each year (1 month)
- 10% of kindergarten students are chronically absent
- *70% do not read on grade level in Title 1 schools*
- *66% students live at or below the poverty level*



Reduction in Absenteeism



- **Chronic Absenteeism:**

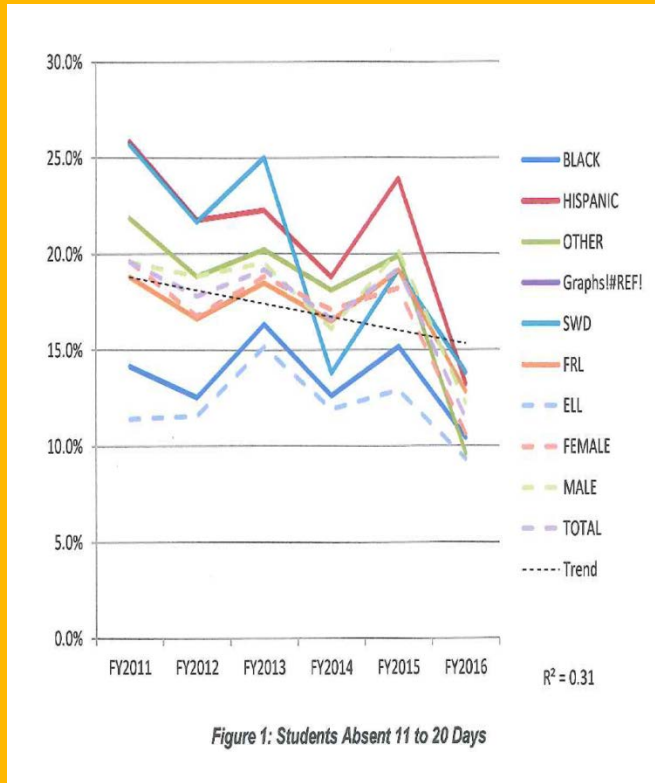
- 8% miss 18 or more school days/year (226 students)
 - Goal to reduce number by 2.5% over 5 years
 - **Results: 3.7% Reduction over 5 years**

- **Immerging Pattern:**

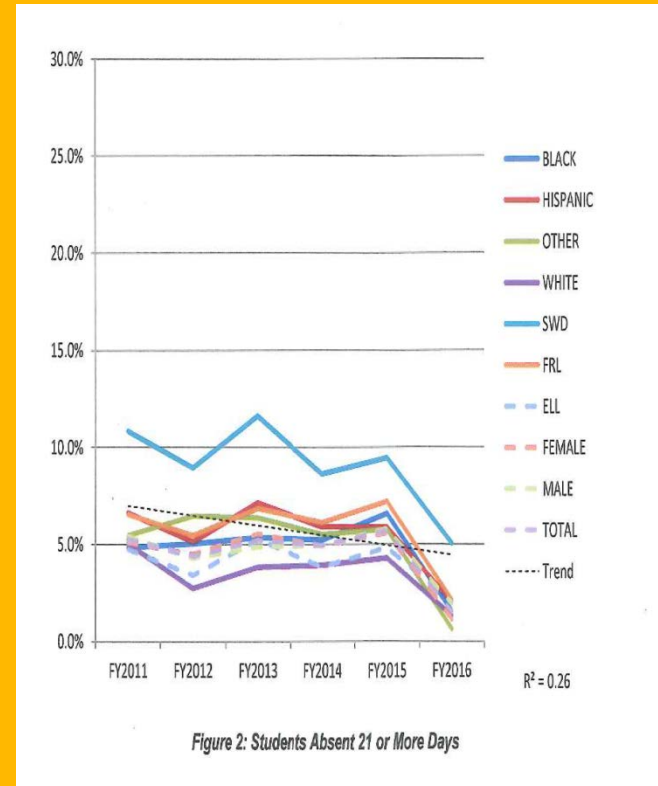
- 20% miss 10-17 School days/year (569 students)
 - Goal to reduce number by 6.5% over five years
 - **Results: 8.2% Reduction over 5 years**



RESULTS: 5 Year Trend

3.7% Reduction!



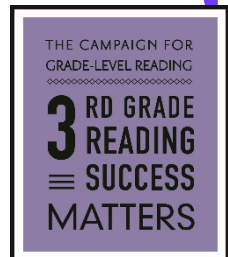
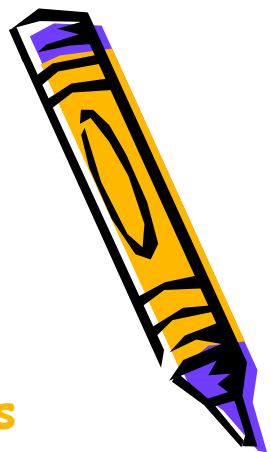
Summer Learning

Goals: Expand academic offerings at summer camps
Expand number of students with access to summer camps

Implementation Strategy for Journey's:
2 hours a day/4 days a week/8 weeks

Results:

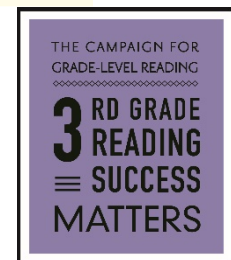
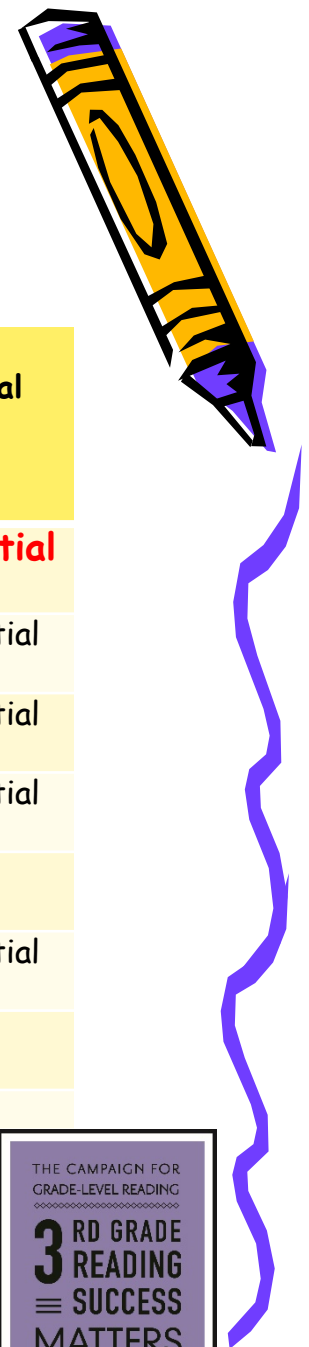
- 2012 - Piloted program 120 children 2 City camp sites - Lesson Learned: need scale to collect data
- 2013 - Expanded to 540 students, 5 camp sites -10% learning gains!
- 2014 - Expanded to 780 Student , 6 camp sites - stemmed summer learning slide!
- 2015 - Expanded to 1,000 Students, 8 camp sites - stemmed summer learning slide
- 2016 - 1,000 students - 8 camps **SIGNIFICANT LEARNING GAINS!**

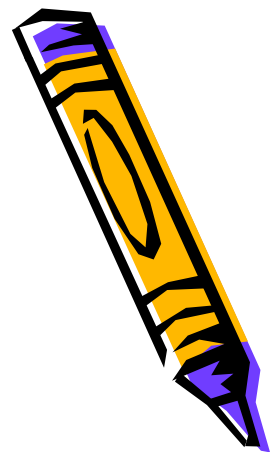


Summer Learning

Expand Access to Books:

Distributed 14,075 books
2,815 students over 5 summers
STEMMED SUMMER LEARNING LOSS!

- 2012 - Piloted program for 2 kindergarten classes at 2 Title 1 schools
- 2013 - Expanded: K-1st grade at 2 Title 1 schools
- 2014 - Expanded: VPK-2nd Grade- 2 Title 1 Schools, k class at 3rd Title 1
- 2015 - Expanded: VPK-2nd Grade at 3 Title 1 schools
- 2016 - Expanded: to provide books to all Title 1 Schools



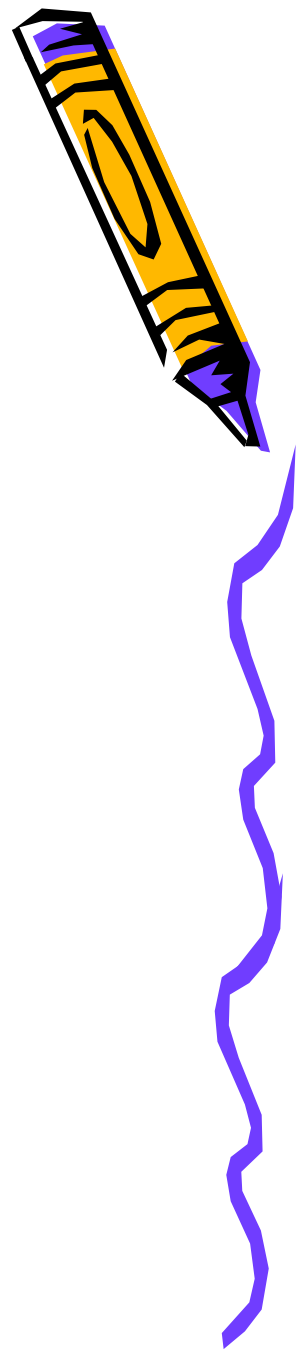

K-12th Grade



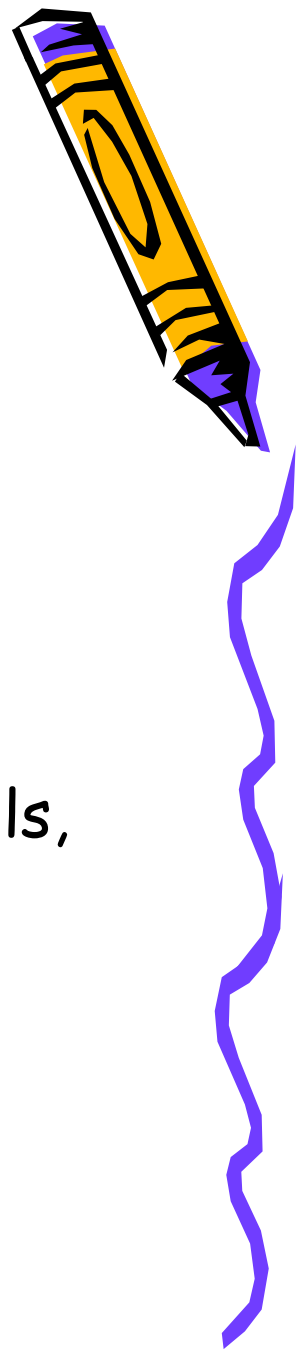
- Sustain Campaign for Grade Level Reading

2017 and Beyond, Con't

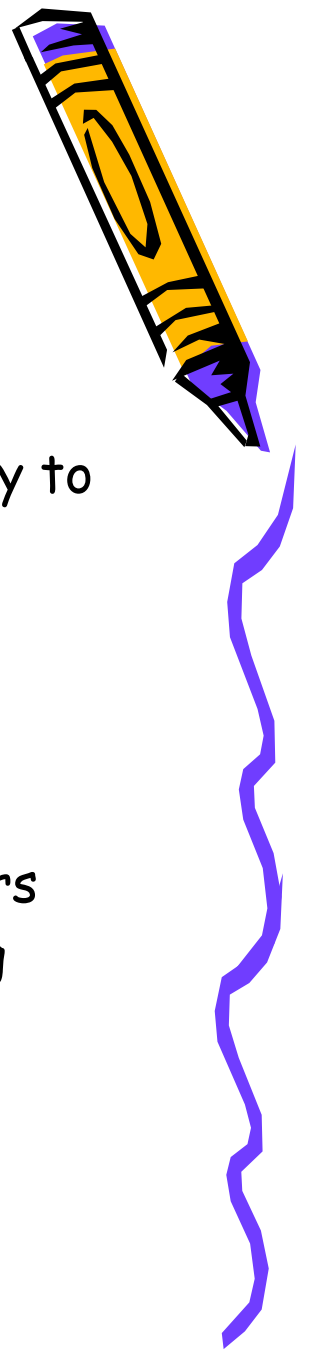
K-12th Grade

- Support non-profit agencies providing youth services
- Increase quality of academic offerings
- Expand school choice: i.e. programming, middle school of arts, medical, etc.
- Support Alternative Schools: ie. charter schools, private schools, vocational options



2017 and Beyond

Post Secondary/Lifelong learning



- Support adult education facility to be located in DB
- Consider policy for relocation of adult education facility to West Atlantic corridor to attract Tri-City area folks
- Create partnerships with local universities and colleges
- Support lifelong learning programs
- Develop mentoring program with business community
- Increase community engagement in Schools
- Provide programming for young professionals and seniors
- Develop policy to create intergenerational programming
